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SPEECH BY MR GOH ECK KHENG, CHAIRMAN OF THE SPEAK GOOD ENGLISH MOVEMENT AT THE LAUNCH OF THE SPEAK GOOD ENGLISH MOVEMENT 2014, AT

3.30PM ON WEDNESDAY 28 MAY 2014, AT THE ARTS HOUSE.

Ladies and gentleman, we have no guest-of-honour for this year's launch of the Speak Good

English Movement. No, we have not been stood up. We did not invite one.

This is because we want Grammar to take centre stage. Today, grammar rules.

For all the years of the movement, we have encouraged Singaporeans to speak 'good

English', 'Standard English', and 'English that is used and understood around the world'.

This year, we feel that it is time to say that this English that we are promoting is also

grammatical English.

Grammar provides structure to the English language. It comes in the form of rules. And since

we Singaporeans are so good at following rules, we think that it will work.

But seriously, Singaporeans are particularly weak in tenses, subject-verb agreement and

prepositions. We also use the syntax of other languages for English, thus fracturing it.

For those of us who are strong in English, grammar is not something we often think about. It

is ingrained in the way we speak and write. However, for those who are weak in English,

going back to the basics of grammar will help them improve.

To this end, the two sets of notebooks we are giving away this year focus on grammar rules

and correct common grammar and syntax mistakes. The editors of The Straits Times have

specially produced one set based on their writing tips and the common mistakes they have

observed. Newspaper editors regularly work to tight schedules, but they do not compromise

on good writing because of deadlines. I thank Warren Fernandez, Editor of *The Straits*

Times, and his team for contributing to the Speak Good English Movement. Their set of

notebooks will be a very helpful resource for everyone.

We also have a funny short story purposely riddled with grammar mistakes to help us rate

our standard of English. See how many mistakes you can spot.

Another way to learn grammar and to improve one's English is to consciously listen to those

who speak English well. So, when we speak grammatical English, we are giving those who

listen to us the opportunity to mimic and improve. The more we use grammatical English, the

more we contribute to the environment of good English in Singapore.
