NINE INSPIRING ENGLISH TEACHERS RECOGNISED

AT THE 10th INSPIRING TEACHER OF ENGLISH AWARDS

13 October 2017 - Nine teachers were awarded the Inspiring Teacher of English Award this

evening. Seven teachers received the Teaching Award which honours outstanding teachers of

English Language, English Literature and General Paper. Two Heads of Department received the

Leadership Award which recognises school leaders who have led in the development and

implementation of an effective English Language programme in their schools. The winners were

selected from 80 nominated English Language teachers.

In conjunction with the award's tenth-year celebrations, the awardees and their students will each

receive a year's complimentary subscription to NewsEd, a digital learning portal for schools,

courtesy of the Straits Times. At the award ceremony today, Guest of Honour Dr Janil Puthucheary,

Senior Minister of State, Ministry of Education & Ministry of Communications and Information,

presented each winner with a trophy, certificate and cash award of \$2,000. Their principals were

also presented a plaque in recognition of each school's support for their award-winning teachers.

The Inspiring Teacher of English Award is presented by the Speak Good English Movement and the

Straits Times, with support from the Ministry of Education. To date, more than 80 teachers have

been recognised for igniting a love for the English language in their students and inspiring them to

think and communicate more effectively in English.

Ms Sheela Devi, a teacher at Temasek Primary School, is one of the winners of the Teaching Award.

Sheela incorporates drama and debate into lessons to engage her students and develop them as

confident speakers. She encourages them to think critically and share their opinions freely, and to

not be afraid to be themselves.

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Ms Michelle Tan, another winner of the Teaching Award, cites her students as her greatest source of inspiration, motivating her to constantly seek new ways of engaging them. In exploring the concept of self-identity, Michelle designed an integrated skills unit inspired and partially modelled after the 'Humans of New York' initiative by Brandon Stanton.

Ms Sharon Chan teaches General Paper and is also a recipient of the Teaching Award. Sharon is energised when she is able to discuss with her students, as equals, issues of the day with the aim of finding different ways to frame and find perspectives. Having taught for 19 years, Sharon continues to explore innovative ways to enhance language teaching for General Paper in the classroom.

Mdm Kogilavani Veerappan, one of two recipients of the Leadership Award, hopes to engage and share visible thinking and ICT-enriched lesson designs with teachers from the English Language fraternity. Kogilavani works closely with her teachers to nurture students to become effective communicators.
