# NINE TEACHERS AWARDED THE INSPIRING TEACHER OF ENGLISH AWARD 2019

**8 October 2019** – Senior Parliamentary Secretary for Education, Ms Low Yen Ling, presented the Inspiring Teacher of English Award (ITEA) to nine award recipients today.

- 2. Out of 122 nominations received this year, 5 recipients were awarded the Teaching Award for excellence in the teaching of English, while 4 recipients received the Leadership Award for leading the development and implementation of an effective English programme. Each recipient received a trophy, certificate and cash award of \$2,000. Among the recipients are:
  - Mrs Joy Drysdale, a recipient of the Teaching Award, has been teaching in CHIJ Primary (Toa Payoh) for the last 30 years. There is never a dull moment in Mrs Drysdale's class as she engages students in learning through activities, such as song and drama. She endeavours to make the learning of the English Language come alive for her students, and help them to develop and realise their fullest potential.
  - Mdm Marianne Cheong, a recipient of the Teaching Award, is a teacher in National Junior College (Secondary Section). She creates opportunities for her students to think critically about situations, concepts, relationships and ideas. She hopes that her students will be able to use the English language to express themselves and make connections with the real world.
  - Mdm Shanthi Deenathayalan, a recipient of the Leadership Award, is Head of Department for English Language at Guangyang Primary School. She is a strong advocate of teacher professional learning, who involves teachers in collaborative learning and actively discusses pedagogical practices with them.
  - Mr Gabriel Chin, a recipient of the Leadership Award, is Head of the English Department in St Andrew's Junior College. He has introduced a weekly professional learning plan in his department to boost teacher ownership and leadership in implementing the General Paper curriculum. A firm believer in looking beyond examination skills, he also encourages his teachers to cultivate life skills in their students.

Annex B

#### AWARD CATEGORIES UNDER THE INSPIRING TEACHER OF ENGLISH AWARD

### 1. Teaching Award

Started in 2008, this award category recognises English teachers in Singapore schools who have:

- · exemplified the use of good spoken and written English;
- promoted learning-focused interaction during English lessons; and
- chosen pedagogies appropriate to learners' needs, abilities and interests.

### 2. Leadership Award

Introduced in 2014, this award category recognises Heads of Department (HODs) / Subject Heads (SHs) / Level Heads (LHs) / Level Coordinators (LCs) who have:

- led their school in the development and implementation of an effective English programme.
- communicated a shared vision for quality teaching and learning that reflects a strong understanding of the organisational culture and the learning needs of staff and students;
- planned an English Language/English Literature/General Paper programme based on the requirements of the relevant national syllabuses to meet the needs of students of the school;
- effectively implemented the English Language programme in a sustained manner; and
- developed the professional expertise of teachers of English so that they are better able to deliver the programme(s).
