



The Tense of a Verb shows whether you are referring to

The Past

**The Present** 

The Future

I <u>wrote</u> a letter; I <u>was writing</u> a letter I <u>write</u> a letter; I <u>am writing</u> a letter I <u>will write</u> a letter; I <u>will be writing</u> a letter

## Use the Simple Past Tense whenever you are referring

(a) to an action that took place at a specific time in the past.



I borrowed three books yesterday.

(b) to a happening in the past that has no effect on the present.



He worked in the Istana for 30 years.
[He doesn't now.]

Use the Present Perfect Tense for action which just happened, or extends to the present.



I have returned three books.



He has worked in the Istana for 30 years. [He still does.]

Use the Past Perfect Tense for action which was completed before another took place



I had borrowed three books. [I returned them and don't have them anymore.]



He had worked in the Istana before he retired two years ago.

## **Simple Past**

**Present** 

I returned three books yesterday

## **Present Perfect**

I have returned three books
