BULAN BAHASA CELEBRATES SG50 WITH A SHOWCASE OF MALAY LANGUAGE AND CULTURE IN SEPTEMBER 2015

In conjunction with SG50, the Malay Language Council, Singapore (MLCS), will be launching *Bulan Bahasa* (Malay Language Month) on **5 September 2015** at Gardens by the Bay followed by a month of programmes and activities expressing the versatility of the Malay language, culture and heritage.

Join us for a weekend of festivities as our partners demonstrate the beauty, vibrancy and essence of *Bahasa Ilmu, Budaya* and *Mesra*.

Mr Zaqy Mohamad, Chairman, *Bulan Bahasa* says, "This year we are staging *Bulan Bahasa* at the internationally-acclaimed Gardens by the Bay, and we invite all Singaporeans to join us to celebrate the richness of our national language".

Immerse yourself in the timelessness and relevancy of Bahasa Melayu

Over the weekend of 5 and 6 September, the community can enjoy a host of programmes taking place at various locations in Gardens by the Bay.

They can meander through the different gardens and experience poetry recital and interactive storytelling sessions on Singapore's myths and legends, told against the colourful backdrop of the "Singapore Stories" floral display.

Members of the public can also enjoy an enthralling showcase of classical and traditional Malay dances as well as *dikir barat* performances. Performers will share the meaning behind the moves allowing everyone to understand the history and significance behind them.

The community can discover the differences and similarities of *Silat* practices of the past and present as practitioners demonstrate *Pencak Silat* through their display of moves and weapons.



Families can test their knowledge on the Malay language and culture while they play fun games such as *Naik Tangga* (Snake and Ladder) and *Congkak*. They can also craft their own *tanjak* (headgear) and other pieces of Malay attire to bring home.

The launch celebrations on 5 September will end with an evening concert set against the beautiful Supertree Grove. Bring along your floor mats and picnic baskets and be treated to an evening of music under the stars.

# **Duta Bahasa (Language Ambassadors) 2015**



**Datuk** Ramli Sarip, also fondly known as 'Papa Rock', started his music career as the frontman of local band, Sweet Charity, first formed in 1969 and largely credited as the band that ignited a 'rock explosion' in Singapore and Malaysia between the 70s and 80s.

In 1985, he left the band to pursue a solo Malay music career. As a solo artist, he transitioned from rock tunes to a more contemplative, Malay folk and traditional-inspired sound. His best-loved original compositions include 'Bukan Kerana Nama'. With over 12 solo albums to his name, he has to date garnered 12 platinum discs and 10 gold discs for best-selling albums.

As *Duta Bahasa*, Ramli firmly believes in the power of music to heighten language appreciation and connect people through lyric and song.





**Nur Hafiza Osman,** better known as Fiza O, is a radio DJ on MediaCorp's Ria 89.7FM. She is also producer of several TV shows targeted at Malay youths, such as 'The 'O' Show', 'Schools' and 'Girlfriends'.

She regularly co-hosts for various Malay programmes and most recently, hosted Suria's singing talent quest, 'Anugerah', and the regional Malay Music Awards, 'Anugerah Planet Muzik'.

As a new mum, Fiza O believes strongly in the importance of preserving and passing on the Malay language to the next generation.



**Hairianto Diman** graduated from the National University of Singapore, with a degree in English Language. Throughout his university education, he was a Hosting Director and Radio Show Presenter at NUS RadioPulze.

As a journalist at *Berita Harian* (BH), his bilingualism gives him a strong advantage as he pursues top stories to convey to the Malay reading audience. Hairianto is an avid user of social media.





**Siti Aisyah Mohamed Salim** is a writer of short stories, better known to most by her pen name, Chempaka Aizim. Her written works, which address literary and current issues, have been published in several newspapers and magazines.

In 2006, her *cerpen* (short story) titled 'Dia Tetap Ada' was awarded the *Anugerah Sayembara Noktah Putih*. In 2013, she received a consolation prize for her *cerpen* titled 'Bicara Rumah Kedai' under the *cerpen* category for *Anugerah Persuratan* (Malay Literary Award) organised by the Malay Language Council, Singapore.

Formerly an honours graduate in Malay literature from the Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, Siti Aisyah currently teaches at Madrasah Alsagoff Al-Arabiah and remains passionate about writing, hoping to publish her next works, soon.



## Themes for Bulan Bahasa 2015

## Ilmu, Budaya, Mesra (Knowledge, Culture, Relationships)

The Malay Language Month invites us to use the Malay Language as a means of obtaining and sharing *knowledge*, of communicating and preserving *culture*, and of strengthening our social ties and *relationships*.

## Language as Knowledge

Our appreciation and understanding of the Malay language is strengthened when we use it in our pursuit of knowledge. Regardless of its use in developing a scholarly understanding of the language, in deepening or acquiring religious knowledge or simply in using it as a means of communication in our daily lives, the Malay language continues to be an important medium for discovering and expanding the knowledge of our community.

### Language as Culture

The graceful and artistic nature of the Malay culture is made even more meaningful through the stylistic qualities of the Malay language that communicates the heart and soul of the Malay people. It is through the language that we recognise and appreciate the richness and significance of our heritage and culture.

## Language builds Relationships

The Malay language strengthens the ties and relationships among its speakers. Regardless of its use through *pantun* or poetry in solemn ceremonies, or in the company of family and friends at the beach, the language creates a warm environment that cultivates closer ties.

The Malay language as '*Ilmu*, *Budaya*, *Mesra*' reflects its importance throughout all layers of society. When we use the Malay language, we are able to preserve knowledge and culture, as well as to foster ties that matter. Our language will also be conserved through its continued use, allowing us to pass it on to the generations after us.
